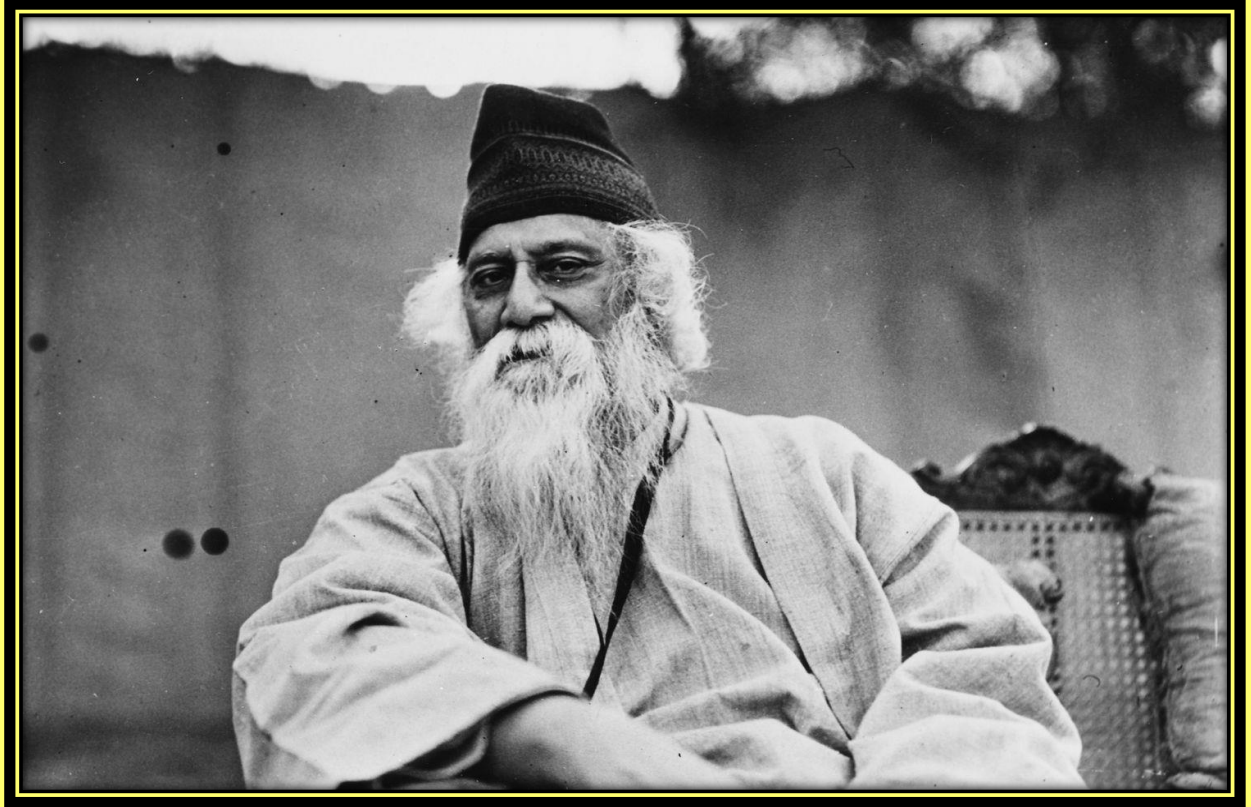

The collapse of the British Raj on the Indian subcontinent and the establishment of two sovereign dominions in South Asia, India and Pakistan, were accompanied by a shift in political boundaries and the division of other resources known as the Partition of India in 1947. Numerous people died as a result of the division, and there was an unusual amount of migration between the two dominions. Due to the creation of new states following independence, there were several more partitions that occurred in various Indian provinces. Centre for Partition Studies at Purash Kanpur Haridas Nandi Mahavidyalaya seeks to critically examine the geopolitical factors that precipitated and followed divisions. Additionally, it promotes the recording and preservation of memories of the partition that are gathered via first-person accounts, artwork, and literature.
